Toronto 2^d October 1837

Sir

In reply to your letter of the 28th ult. I have the honor to inform you that His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor will receive the Deputation of Chiefs of the Six Nations Indian and Area tomorrow at 11 o'clock on the subject of disposing of the Grand River Navigation Works on Tuesday next at 12 o'clock.

I am also directed by His Excellency to request that your wife Captain John Proctor who now commands this deputation that His Excellency's time is so much occupied on Public matters of the highest importance that he can devote but a small portion of it to the Chiefs who are now waiting on him - and therefore in order to save as much time as possible and prevent the possibility of misapprehension by either party he directs that the Indians be at my office at 10 o'clock A.M. on Tuesday for the purpose of enabling me to receive & verify the substance

to him -

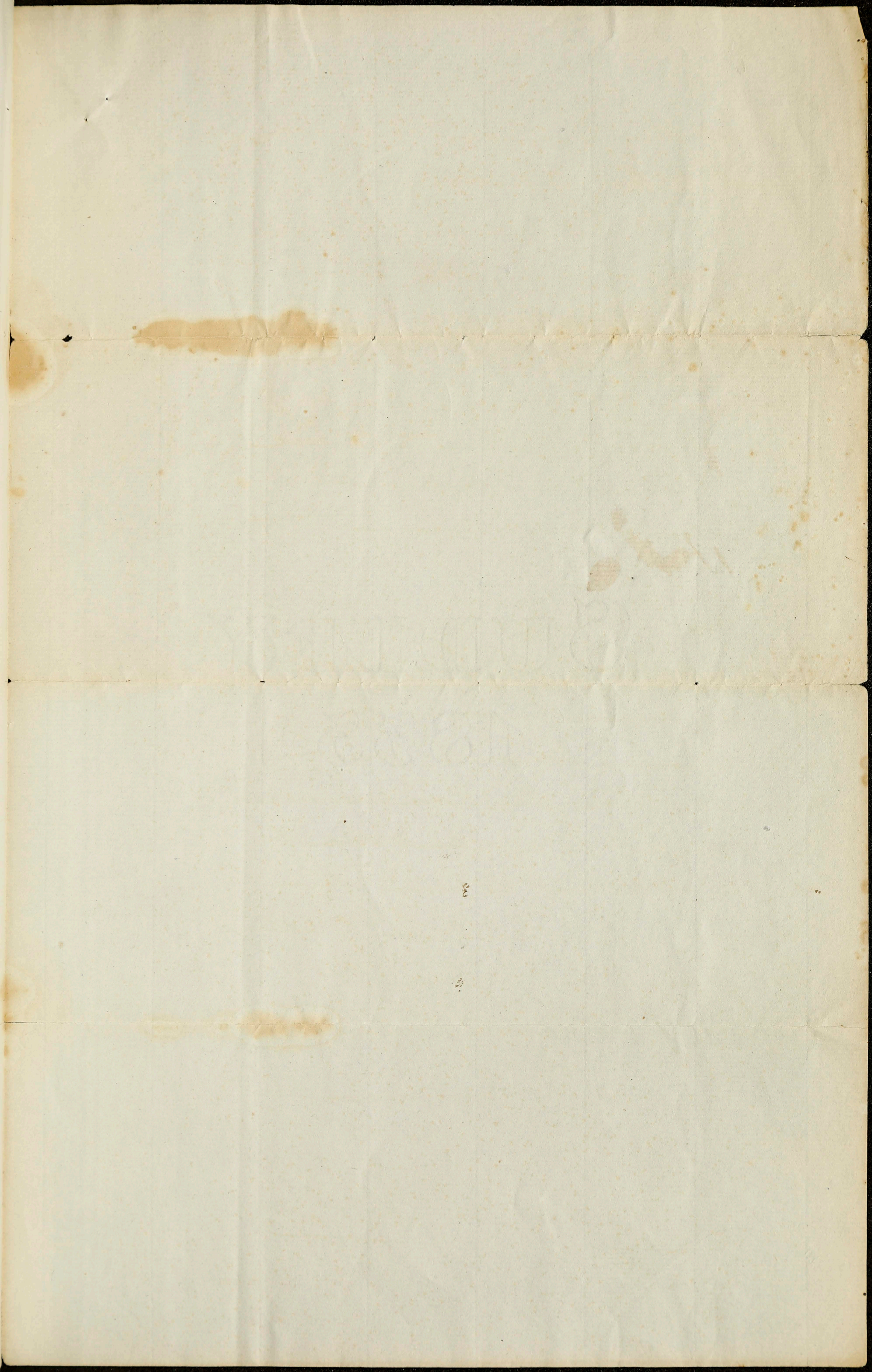
I have suggested to
